- Suggestions for Sustainable Ag in the state:
  - **Most popular:** Community engagement, marketing techniques, how to get resources, economic issues workshops, networking efforts
  - **Popular:** increase information outreach, green infrastructure, accessibility to low-income communities, farm tours around the state, workshops on something similar to "New Roots" in Kentucky
  - **Other:** more information on hydroponics, engage AG Center by hook or crook, pull extension agents in more, better focusable projection, emphasis on urban farming
- Managed acreage of those currently farming (only 21 out of 62 responded with acreage)
  - 12 farming on 2 acres or less
  - 6 farming on 2-10 acres
  - 3 farming on 10 acres or more (38 acres, 64 acres, 400 acres)
- Of the current farmers 29 grow vegetables, 17 grow fruit, 5 tend poultry, 3 grains, 2 tend livestock, 9 others—mushrooms, goats/sheep, herbs, cut flowers, etc.
