



How to use the handbook:

Definitions of Opportunities:

- 1.Internship: Internships are training and work opportunities for beginning farmers. Each arrangement is unique and set-up to meet the needs of the established farmer and beginning farmer.
- 2. Employment opportunity: Employment can be temporary, seasonal or permanent.
- 3. Work Exchange: Work exchange opportunities can be single project focused or part of a regular day at the farm. An example would be fencing project that could sue a couple hands and benefit someone new to fence construction.
- 4.**Informal Day Visits:** Informal field days are a one-on-one tour of your farm where a beginning farmer has the chance to see your operation and ask questions.
- 5.Land Link Opportunities: land link is a project that connects beginning farmers to established farmers who are willing to offer use of land or equipment in exchange for rent or farm products (vegetables, meat, etc.). Each arrangement is unique and set up to meet the needs of the established farmer and beginning farmer.

- (2) Use the beginning of the season survey to fill out a Growing Season Learning Plan

Two uses for the farmer:

- (1) Request that trainees evaluate themselves using the Farming Skills Evaluation at the beginning of their seasonal work on the farm. Farmers may also want to ask the trainee to fill out a Growing Season Learning Plan for clarity on which topics are priorities in the given season.
- (2) Farmers may wish to highlight certain areas on the Farming Skills Evaluation that are enforced on their farm.
