Farm acreage in Onondaga and Madison Counties has decreased by over 50 percent since 1950, so the Cazenovia Area Community Development Association joined together with the American Farmland Trust to address the issues leading local farmers to abandon their enterprises. A conference and series of workshops educated farmers and public officials about the economic impact of agriculture and its future possibilities. The group produced a 50-page book to increase public understanding of what makes farming important to our area. If their efforts are successful, local residents will be inspired to join the fight to preserve our farming culture and heritage.
