Grey Duck Garlic, LLC

Grey Duck Garlic, LLC is happy to have received a \$10,362 grant for the project: "Effectiveness and economic impact of weed control systems in organic garlic production." The grant was generously awarded by Organic Farming Research Foundation (OFRF) <http://ofrf.org/index.html>. OFRF distributes grants that help generate knowledge that supports modern organic farming methods.

Weeding is one of the most time consuming jobs in producing organic hardneck garlic. The grant is to study the effectiveness and cost of four different weed control methods: soil solarization, sterile seedbed technique, flame weeding and hand weeding on garlic. After the trial is completed, this information will be made available to other farmers.

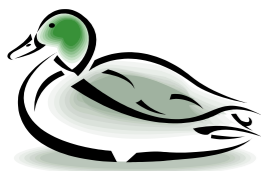

Chris Bailey, their farm manager, has mechanized and expanded their operation. They are interested in helping to promote organic farming through education and research.



Morning Owl Farm

Rural Roots member, Mary Rohlfing, received a \$15,000, three-year WSARE Farmer-Rancher Grant for her study, "What Good Are Pasture-Raised Ducks to Whole Farm Planning?" In the research, Rohlfing will record the effectiveness of a flock of 250-300 ducks on soil fertility and in weed and pest management.

Mildew Got You Down?

Organic table grapes are a lucrative new alternative crop for small to mid-range producers in southwest Idaho. Powdery mildew, *Uncinula necator*, is the single most economically important disease threatening growers' ability to achieve high quality, marketable fruit. Management of this disease is critical to the success of producers and the sustainability of the industry.

A central obstacle is that most of the available information on powdery mildew management has been developed for growers in California, Washington and Oregon.

In this project, our University of Idaho research and extension team (Ariel Agenbroad, Tony McCammon, Essie Fallahi, Krishna Mohan), in collaboration with producer Mike Medes, will assemble a set of sustainable grower management strategies, or "protocols" we deem appropriate for southwest Idaho organic table grape production. We will focus on preventative measures such as grapevine trellis systems, early detection and climate-based disease forecasting, and use approved organic fungicide treatments when necessary.

Our protocols will be trialed at Rocky Fence Vineyards, a nine acre, certified organic table grape operation in Emmett, Idaho. The protocols we develop will establish University of Idaho Extension recommendations for powdery mildew management specific to organic table grape production in our region. Information will be distributed to producers and professionals through diverse, hands-on, interactive outreach activities, reports and publications. Sustainable Livestock Production Workshop

This fall Cultivating Success™ will be hosting a short, one-day course in sustainable livestock production. Keynote speaker Joel Huesby, co-owner of Thundering Hooves, from Walla Walla, WA, along with other knowledgeable regional producers, will discuss the sustainable practices they implement on their farms and ranches. Topics covered include pasture management, grazing techniques, animal husbandry, grass farming, appropriately scaled farming, local food systems, and processing, distribution, and marketing your products. The course includes producer-led panel discussions that will discuss sustainable techniques for raising a variety of species including cattle, sheep, pigs, goats, chickens and turkeys. The course will be held Saturday, October 25 from 8:30 am until 4:30 pm at the 1912 Center in Moscow, Idaho. Workshop costs \$25 for a full day, including lunch or \$15 for a half day with no lunch. 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Workshop Wrap-Up

This spring Rural Roots hosted 13 different workshops throughout Idaho and Eastern Washington with a total of 213 attendees. There were three separate focuses for the workshops including direct marketing, food safety and legal liability.

After looking through the evaluations, each of the workshops seemed to have one topic that stood out for participants. For direct marketing, people were most enthusiastic about developing their retail markets and creating websites for their businesses. After the workshop 80% of participants felt that they had the knowledge necessary to develop a clear, compelling message and could successfully market their product or service.

As for food safety, hand washing stations were by far the biggest hit. The majority of the evaluations mentioned implementing a hand washing station in the field or at the farmers' market. The workshop also heightened awareness of cross contamination and attendees were dedicated to eliminating its causes.

Unsurprisingly, the overriding theme of the legal liability workshops was liability insurance. Nearly all of the participants commented that they would meet with an insurance agent to get better coverage for their farm or business. In addition, the legal liability evaluations showed a growing interest towards incorporating agritourism into their business.

Overall, the workshops were a success and many of the participants expressed their appreciation and commented that they were extremely useful.



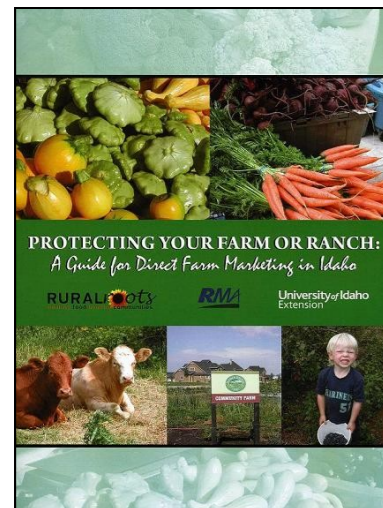
Rural Roots Board Members Host On-Farm Fundraisers

The focus of the Pasture Walk was grasses, weed control, multi-species grazing, operational and environmental sustainability.

Unlike a normal farm tour, the Pasture Walk focused directly on solving the challenges the Eaton's face in managing their pastures in and above Wawawai Canyon, 15 miles southwest of Pullman, Washington. Pasture Walk participants had the opportunity to voice their issues and concerns and to participate in on-site, real time discussions of ways these issues could be addressed. Participants learned about pasture management practices that are effective in dry-land areas of the Inland Northwest.
