"It's good if farmers have their hands in the books...doing some of the daily work, so they are seeing what's going in and going out," Frances reported, "and one thing I've learned is, do not just wait until they call you. Now it's, 'Okay, we're making a meeting for the next time and we're talking." The course is also an opportunity for professionals like Frances to discuss how to advise clients when changes take place. One example is, she noted, "When you've got a loan or an asset purchase, something that's out of the ordinary." Effective bookkeeping illuminates those changes, and other aspects such as depreciation, and how they matter in annual tax filings.

The course is impacting participants' service strategies, too. "One thing I changed...is making sure that I get more basic data first," Frances explained, "I really should see someone's IRS Schedule F [profit or loss from farming], and I need their depreciation list, and to make sure I'm really clear on their entity structure." With these kinds of take-aways from the course, Frances and her professional peers are expanding options and services for small- and mid-scale farmers, ranchers, and fishers across California and beyond.
