


2) What is the estimated maximum number of pigs you have on site at any one time during the year (all age groups combined)?























8) Do you practice "down time" or fallow periods for your swine housing infrastructure? (Versus continuous flow management) Please explain.

- Winter housing is not used in summer, summer housing is moveable houses on the ground
- Not applicable

- Yes winter housing not used in summer when pigs are in woods/pasture
- We use a Management Intensive Rotation System. We continuously farrow all year but in various locations that have "down time". Example our livestock barn is used for farrowing in March and April and then has no livestock in it for the 10 other months.
- Yes, all pigs are on fresh pasture in the grazing season and winter housing is only used November through April.
- Yes, Swine are moved to pasture housing in Summer, and sows farrow in main pig barn.
- We give our sows a cycle or two off between litters.
- No we do not do downtime.
- Downtime for buildings and pasture pen
- Our winter housing area is not used all May to Oct or Nov. For the grazing season all pigs
 are rotated on pasture the goal is to only have pigs cover the same acre one or two times in a
 year.
- As much as possible. We're still building to improve our housing infrastructure to make this easier in the future.
- Yes, We farrow outdoors in March and Sept. The breeding stock spend the winter in our breeding barn.
- Currently no down time as we are a year round farrow system lacking infrastructure to obtain this


