








- Recruit and screen potential workers, providing a ready supply of reasonably skilled farm workers willing and able to perform the basic functions of farm work including specialty crop production and livestock production

- Do the paperwork necessary to hire and pay them in accordance with the law, including handling all aspects of payroll and associated costs and all tax related fillings

Ability to lead decision—making

• You assist in setting rules for how farms request workers, how workers are allocated, the extent and type of training provided, etc.


• This is unpaid leadership, ie, as a board of directors member


• You would serve with other farmer-leaders



Opportunity to receive dividends


- Imagine Entity X is profitable

- Takes in more from hourly fees than it spends on wages and overhead.

- This likely requires expanding into market for labor in commercial landscaping or home gardening (Entity X is unlikely to be profitable serving farms alone).








Enforceability of OSHA

• If your farm sourced labor from Entity X, your farm would need to comply with state and federal OSHA requirements that may include:

• Identifying safety hazards specific to your farming operations and training workers in health and safety practices to address those hazards

• Establishing a system for recording and reporting worker injuries and illness

• Establishing a system for providing personal protective equipment and training workers in the proper use of protective equipment

• Providing field sanitation facilities on your farm

Enforceability of OSHA


- Entity X would also provide guidance and assistance in complying with OSHA, for example by
- Providing template procedures and forms
- Managing communications with agencies

- Note: OSHA otherwise becomes enforceable against farms when they have more than 10 employees

Registration as a Farm Labor Contractor

• If your farm sourced labor from Entity X, your farm may need to comply with specific federal rules, including:

• Verifying that Entity X maintains current registration as a farm labor contractor

• Verifying that employees have been provided with written information about workers compensation insurance and the specific conditions of the work they will perform on your farm


• Posting information on your farm about worker rights and legal protections

• Taking specific actions if you become aware that a worker is not being properly paid
