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SU Ag Center Set to Host Its 82nd Annual State Livestock and Poultry Show



About the Southern University Ag Center's Livestock Show

The Southern University Ag Center's State Livestock and Poultry Show was established in 1943 as a poultry show by J.W. Fisher, Director of the College of Agriculture and Tom J. Jordan, State Cooperative Extension Agent, along with a group of statewide vocational agricultural teachers, agricultural extension workers, and community leaders.

A dairy calf project was added in the second year and the show's name was changed to the State Poultry and Dairy Show with youth exhibitors (participants) from limited-resource families.

This year, over 100 youth from across Louisiana will show around 160 animals during the event, allowing them to showcase their hard work in raising and caring for various breeds of cattle, hogs, sheep, lamb, goats, and poultry. Winners will receive cash awards, premiums, banners, ribbons, rosettes, and trophy belt buckles.

The Livestock Show cultivates the development of responsibility, dedication, decision-making, leadership, and entrepreneurship skills to the youth who prepare throughout the year for competitions, through the possession and personal care of a live animal project.

"Cultivating Healthy Environments and Revitalizing Resources for Youth"



The Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center's innovative Cultivating Healthy Environments and Revitalizing Resources for Youth (C.H.E.R.R.Y.) Pick Program recently made its 2024 debut at IDEA Bridge Charter School in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Designed to break new ground in nutrition education, the program's impact extends well beyond the traditional scope of SNAP-Ed programming.

SNAP-Ed typically focuses on teaching individuals who use or are eligible for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits about proper nutrition, gardening, and strategies to make food dollars stretch further. These lessons often include physical activity and are frequently delivered directly to K-12 students. While this approach effectively builds healthier communities, the C.H.E.R.R.Y. Pick Program takes a unique and impactful direction by targeting educators instead of students. Rather than delivering lessons directly to students, C.H.E.R.R.Y. Pick equips faculty and staff with essential knowledge about nutrition, physical activity, and gardening. By empowering the educators, the program ensures the continuation of these vital lessons long after the SNAP-Ed team has departed.

"C.H.E.R.R.Y. Pick gives schools the tools to sustain health and wellness education," said Joshua McDonald, SU Ag Center Nutrition Education Programs Coordinator and Director of the C.H.E.R.R.Y. Pick Program. "Our goal is to create a ripple effect where healthy habits extend from teachers to students and, ultimately, to the wider community."

At IDEA Bridge, the C.H.E.R.R.Y. Pick Program seamlessly integrated into the school's environment, blending nutrition workshops with practical gardening sessions and physical activity demonstrations. Faculty and staff were trained in engaging, evidence-based methods to teach students about healthy living.

“Our students are more excited than ever about health and wellness because their teachers are leading by example,” expressed Danesha Shepherd, Agriculture Teacher at IDEA Bridge Charter School. “The gardening sessions have been especially impactful, helping students connect with their food and understand the importance of sustainability,” she added.

The C.H.E.R.R.Y. Pick Program's hands-on approach left students eager to participate in gardening projects and embrace healthier lifestyles.

“We've seen a shift in how students view food and nutrition,” stated Shepherd. “They're asking questions about what they eat and even sharing what they learn with their families. It's amazing to see how this program has sparked a genuine interest in wellness.”

By fostering a culture of health and sustainability, C.H.E.R.R.Y. Pick ensures the lessons of SNAP-Ed resonate far beyond the classroom. This innovative model highlights the importance of empowering educators to be leaders in wellness education, creating a sustainable framework for healthier communities.



The success of the C.H.E.R.R.Y. Pick Program at IDEA Bridge Charter School sets a precedent for other schools across Louisiana. By shifting the focus to educators, Southern University's Ag Center has redefined how nutrition education can be delivered, making it both sustainable and impactful.

With the success of this program, the hope is that more schools will adopt this model, empowering teachers to champion health and wellness and inspiring students to make lifelong healthy choices. IDEA Bridge's success story is a testament to the transformative power of education and community-focused initiatives like C.H.E.R.R.Y. Pick.

Future Leaders Take Flight: Exploring Drone Technology With the SU Ag Center

The SU Ag Center's Precision Agcademy Youth Development program has been holding engaging and impactful Drone Demo Daze for youth.

Ag Center staff members Dr. Charity Schaffer, Youth Development Extension Agent; Ryan Sugulleh, Assistant Director of the Communities of Color Network; Aryn Broussard, Assistant Area Agent for Youth Development; Robert Easley, Jr., Director of Advancement; and Dr. Raquel Ayles, Youth Development Program Leader facilitated the sessions, sharing their expertise and passion for drone technology.

Drone Demo Daze have been held on December 4, 2024 in New Orleans for students at St. Augustine High School, January 18, 2025 in Baton Rouge for students in the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. Nu Gamma Omega Chapter's Youth Leadership Institute, and January 27, 2025 in Opelousas for students at Hope for Opelousas.



These hands-on educational events are designed to introduce students to the exciting world of drone technology, highlighting career opportunities, and providing practical experience with unmanned aerial systems.

Under the Ag Center's guidance, students gained valuable insights into the technical and operational aspects of drones, including navigation, safety procedures, and advanced flight features. Beyond technical skills, the students learned about the wide range of career pathways that drone pilot certification can unlock, including roles in agriculture, real estate, engineering, emergency response, and aerial photography.

A key highlight of the sessions has been the hands-on flying experience, where students are able to pilot drones and explore their functionality. For many, this was their first encounter with drone technology, sparking curiosity and enthusiasm for careers in aviation, engineering, and technology. The real-world demonstration offered a tangible connection between classroom learning and future professional opportunities, making the sessions both engaging and educational.

The Drone Demo Daze are part of the SU Ag Center's ongoing mission to empower youth through education, technology, and leadership development. By fostering interest in drone technology and aviation careers, the program aims to certify students as FAA Part 107 drone pilots to expand their career opportunities and create entrepreneurial opportunities for themselves in a rapidly evolving technological landscape.

By introducing students to emerging technologies, we are not only inspiring the next generation of drone pilots and aviation professionals but also empowering young leaders to soar to new heights in all areas of their lives.

Southern University Ag Center Launches FAA Part 107 Drone Certification Program



The Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center proudly launched its inaugural FAA Part 107 small, unmanned aircraft certification course on January 25, 2025 in Opelousas, La. This pioneering initiative aims to equip Louisiana youth with the skills and credentials necessary to legally operate drones for commercial purposes, opening doors to a range of professional opportunities in emerging industries.

The program was established under the leadership of Dr. Raquel Ayles, Program Leader of the SU Ag Center's Youth Development Program, and is spearheaded by a distinguished team of FAA Part 107 certified pilots: Dr. Charity Schaffer, Youth Development Agent; Robert Easley, SU Ag Center's Director of Advancement; and Ryan Sugulleh, Assistant Director of the SU Ag Center's Communities of Color Network.

This cohort was established through a partnership with Hope for Opelousas Nonprofit Organization's Executive Director Loren Carriere and through collaboration with Heather Bob, Community and Youth Outreach Specialist at the Ag Center's Sustainable Agriculture Rural Development Institute (SARDI).

The certification program is the first initiative under Precision Agcademy, a program designed to teach precision agriculture, an innovative farming practice that utilizes technology to collect, analyze, and act on data to improve crop yields and resource management. The Precision Agcademy operates under the umbrella of the SU Ag Center's Youth Development Program.





Since the launch of the Center's Drone Demo Daze, an outreach component of the Precision Agcademy in September 2024, nearly 200 students have been engaged across multiple Louisiana parishes, including St. Helena, Tangipahoa, East Baton Rouge, Orleans, and St. Landry. Through Drone Demo Daze, the program sparks youth interest in precision agriculture and the drone certification course. Additionally, the program has had the honor of serving two military veterans.

To support this initiative, more than \$30,000 has been raised through private philanthropy, and \$250,000 in federal funding has been awarded through the United States Department of Agriculture's

National Institute of Food and Agriculture (USDA-NIFA). These investments ensure the sustainability and growth of the program, expanding access to drone technology training for Louisiana's youth.

Expanding Career Pathways

The demand for certified drone pilots continues to rise across industries such as real estate, agriculture, emergency response, construction, and photography. By earning an FAA Part 107 certification, students will be equipped to take advantage of these opportunities, enhancing their employability and entrepreneurial potential.

The SU Ag Center looks forward to expanding



the impact of this program, reaching more youth across the state and empowering them with the skills needed to thrive in a technology-driven world.

SU Ag Center Launches Groundbreaking “Ethnic Vegetable Planting Guide” With Support From SARE



The Southern University Ag Center has developed an “*Ethnic Vegetable Planting Guide*.”

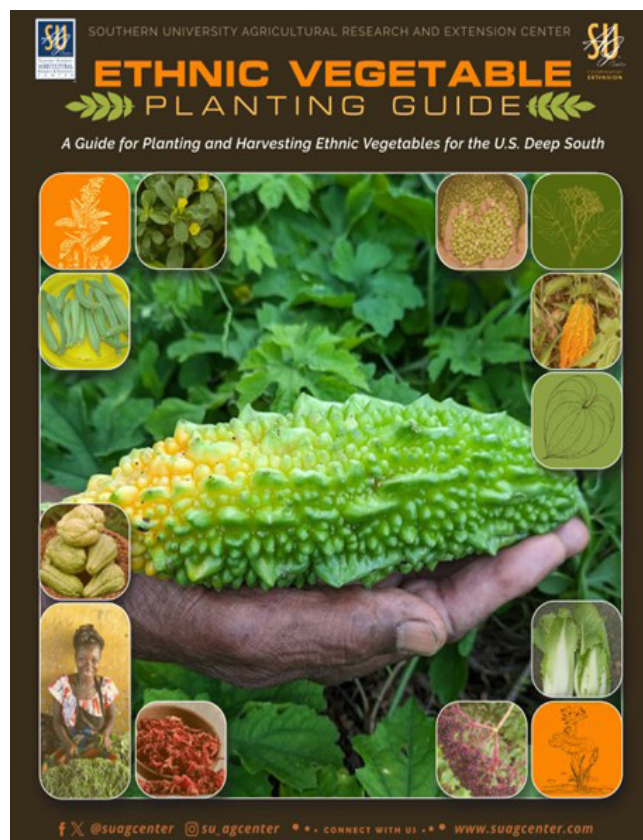
This first-of-its-kind guide, which is available in print and digitally on the Ag Center’s website, features a diverse range of ethnic vegetables, detailing optimal planting and harvesting times, unique cultural facts, and preparation techniques for the produce. Given Louisiana’s subtropical climate, many tropical fruits and vegetables thrive when planted at the appropriate times.

For decades, the SU Ag Center has been at the forefront of research and education on cultivating and promoting ethnic vegetables in Louisiana.

Examples of featured crops include Hibiscus roselle (*Hibiscus sabdariffa*), Molokhia (*Corchorus olitorius*), Kenaf (*Hibiscus cannabinus*), Sweet Potato Greens (*Ipomoea batatas*), Amaranth (*Amaranthus*), and a variety of other globally consumed fruits and vegetables.

The creation of this comprehensive print and digital resource will enhance knowledge dissemination across Louisiana, empowering home gardeners, urban farmers, and small-scale growers across the country to successfully cultivate, market, and enjoy these crops.

The “Ethnic Vegetable Planting Guide” was produced with funding from the Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE) Program and authored by Stephanie M. Elwood, Horticulture Specialist at the SU Ag Center and Mila Berhane, Senior Research Associate at the SU Ag Center, with valuable contributions from Terra Polite and Mitchell Provensal.

Center of Excellence at the Southern Ag Center Partners On \$500,000 USDA Grant to Improve Food Safety Training

The Center of Excellence for Nutrition, Health, Wellness, and Quality of Life (COE) at the Southern University Ag Center is part of a collaborative effort recently awarded nearly \$500,000 in funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture National Institute of Food and Agriculture's (USDA-NIFA) Food Safety Outreach Program (FSOP). The Southern University Ag Center received \$70,000 of this funding to play a key role in outreach and training delivery.

The initiative, which involves the LSU AgCenter, Southern University Ag Center, and Florida A&M University, aims to provide enhanced food safety training for farm workers and underserved farmers. It focuses on innovative and interactive learning techniques.

This joint project, titled "On-Farm Food Safety Training for Farm Workers and Underserved Farmers Covering FSMA PSR and GAPs Requirements," moves away from traditional slideshow-based methods, adopting hands-on activities, posters, and flipcharts to deliver short, on-farm lessons. These cover topics like Good Agricultural Practices (GAPs), worker health and hygiene, sanitation, risk assessment, and compliance with the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Produce Safety Rule (PSR).

The program provides a range of resources, including risk assessment tools, standard operating procedure templates, fact sheets, and recordkeeping logs. These tools help growers identify potential food safety hazards, evaluate current practices, and strengthen areas that need improvement. Onsite audits will also be conducted to support the implementation of robust food safety practices.

Achyut Adhikari, an LSU AgCenter food safety specialist and principal investigator for the grant, emphasized the project's transformative impact. "This grant allows us to bridge critical knowledge gaps among farmworkers and underserved farmers, equipping them with the tools and resources needed to meet regulatory and market-driven food safety requirements and ensure the integrity of our food system," he said.

The project also supports bilingual training to accommodate the number of Spanish-speaking farmers and farmworkers in Louisiana and Florida. This inclusivity ensures broader access to the training and resources needed to strengthen food safety practices across diverse farming communities. Additionally, the program bolsters the food safety capacity of two minority institutions, Southern University and Florida A&M, by leveraging the LSU AgCenter's resources.

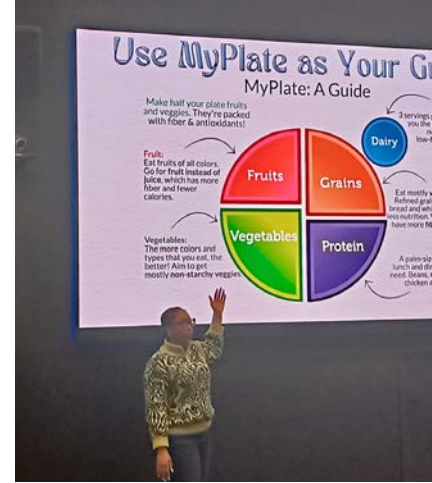
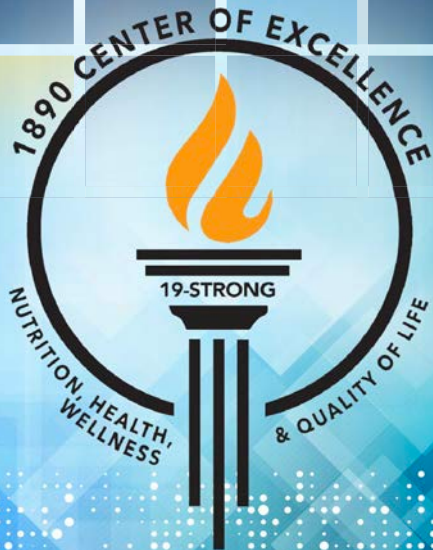
"This funding enables us to create a more inclusive and practical approach to food safety training, especially for growers who are often overlooked in conventional programs," Adhikari added. "By providing hands-on training and tailored resources, we aim to enhance understanding of critical food safety practices, ensuring compliance with regulations and protecting public health."

COE Staff Holds Workshops During Southern University's Spring 2025 Faculty Convocation



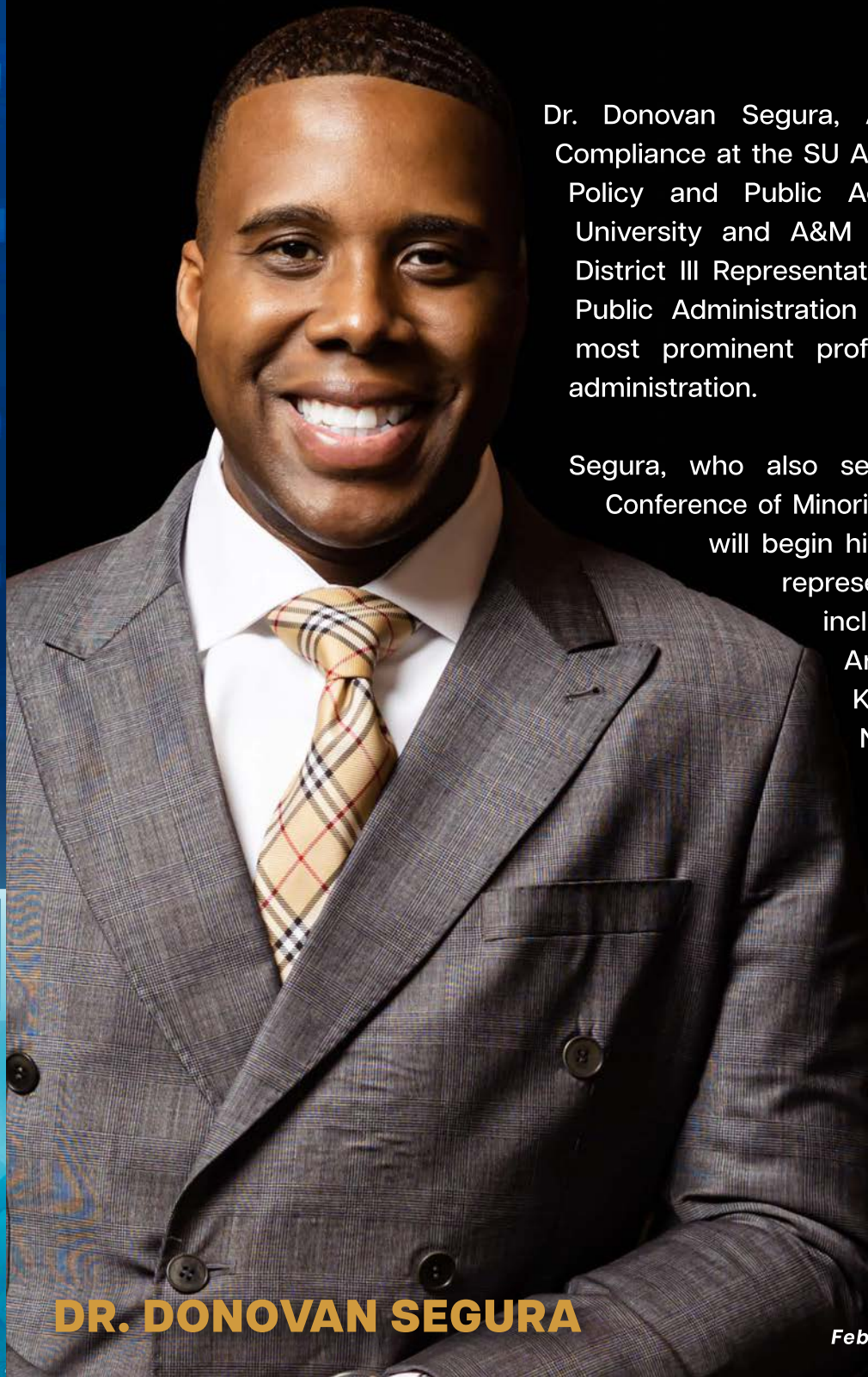

Dr. Donovan Segura Has Been Elected as the Representative of ASPA's Third District



Dr. Donovan Segura, Associate Vice Chancellor for Compliance at the SU Ag Center and Professor of Public Policy and Public Administration at the Southern University and A&M College, has been elected the District III Representative of the American Society for Public Administration (ASPA) Board, the largest and most prominent professional association for public administration.

Segura, who also serves as the President of the Conference of Minority Public Administrators (COMPA), will begin his three-year term as District III's representative in April. The district includes ASPA members in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee.

He will be the only African American male serving on the ASPA Board.
