2:00 — 3:00 PM	Dr. Myers of Farms To Grow, Inc. started the documentary project in 2012 and toured 10 southern states Texas, Arkansas, South Carolina, North Carolina, Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Tennessee and Florida – to interview over 30 farmers, sharecroppers, gardeners, and a 5th generation coil basket weaver. Several of the interviews were with elders ranging in ages from 92 to 109. These interviews represent generations of cultural traditions of Black farming philosophy that honors land, sustainability, God, family and love for their community.

	Dr. Gail Myers, Cultural Anthropologist, Co-Founder of Farms to Grow Inc., Director and Producer of <i>Rhythms of the Land</i>	
	In this talk, Dr. Myers enlightens that beyond the intrinsic value of land, the place-based relation- ship furthers a collective work and responsibility ethic, and a sense of power. As all-Black towns developed in the late 19th and 20th centuries, it was the collective approach that sustained these Black communities. Landowners donated parcels of land for building churches and schools for the entire community. Black Farmers and ranchers maintained agrarian traditions that provided the provisions to maintain traditional food ways.

You Can Do Your Part:

Keep Soil Covered

It's the first step in protecting it from erosion, but also buffers soil temperature, slows rainfall runoff, and aids rainfall infiltration.

Minimize Soil Disturbance
Both physical and chemical. This
proactive measure can heal and
protect properties of the soil and
ultimately enhance the biological
component of soil life.

Maximize Living Roots

Doing this longer throughout the year fuels biological activity, aids nutrient cycling, and contributes to improved soil structure.

Energize with Diversity

Use different crop species and integrate livestock where possible for specific purposes to enhance chemical, physical and/or biological aspects of the soil. It improves the whole system.


