

Take the Pledge

The Cover Crop Pledge is a commitment to talk to your family about putting a few acres of your land into cover crops to see how their roots can protect your family roots.

A single crop of grain sown into your exsisting cash crop and left standing after harvest protects your land during the harsh winter.

The practice is compatible with existing equipment and is no more complex than how you already farm. The NRCS even offers you financial help to get started.

Some women landowners have never considered cover crops. Others have never spoken to their families about protecting their family roots. A simple conversation may be all it takes to start preserving the memories and histories tied to your land.
