What:

This workshop, designed to benefit farmers who grow vegetables, fruit and field crops, will focus on the continued capacity of the soil to function as a vital living system that sustains plant, animal and human health. Healthy soils rich in organic matter drain better, have greater disease resistance, and better water holding capacity in times of drought. Healthy soils are important to your bottom line!

Soil health experts Ray Archuleta – a.k.a. Ray The Soil Guy – of the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service's National Soil Health Team in Greensboro, North Carolina; UMass graduate student Julie Stultz Fine will cover the economics of soil health, the benefits of deep zone tillage, and cover crops for soil health. The day will include classroom presentations, hands-on demonstrations and field exercises on rolling cover crops, a soil pit investigation, and a rainfall simulation on healthy and not-so-healthy soils. Pesticide recertification credits have been requested from MDAR.
