




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

Silvopasture has been a primary research and extension arena for Fike for over 20 years, and he has focused on developing new information and demonstrations to show the multiple production, animal welfare, and ecosystem benefits of integrating trees into pastures. Fike grew up on a small family dairy farm in Virginia.

Silver Run Forest Farm is a riparian nursery, woodland collective, and folk school rooted in love and living soil. These roots sprout out as agroforestry, watershed health, and restorative justice. In their nursery, they cultivate and celebrate tree crops and other plant allies that cross-pollinate food sovereignty and ecological restoration. They tend the silver waters of Shenandoah - Cub Run, Blacks Run, and downstream - by farming in the image of the forest and remediating the toxins that pollute souls, society, and soil, from erosion to empire. They do all this to propagate plants and power that feed the earth.

Clay and Cynthia Miller started Hidden Hollow Farm right next to Clay's parent's farm, Turley Creek. Now they run the day-to-day of both farms, with guidance from Pam and Dennis. These generational farmers enjoy a gorgeous landscape adjacent to the Shenandoah River. Daily tasks for this busy family include walking the chickens, completing paperwork, preparing meals for hungry toddlers, and keeping up with chores, maintenance, and repairs. The Millers enjoy a bountiful life outside of chicken farming, too. They love to garden and to bottle-feed their calves and lambs. They attend fairs where they often show sheep, participate in frequent church events, and love to be outdoors as a family. Clay and Cynthia want to grow healthier chickens and feel proud of their work. All their chicks arrive in good health, and being able to raise fewer birds according to organic standards creates a "better growing environment".

Holsinger Homeplace Farms is a family farm providing natural food products to the Shenandoah Valley. Farmer/cattleman Major Buck Holsinger is a full-time pilot, and runs this farm with the help of his wife Amanda and four children. He is the ninth generation of his family on this farm. They specialize in Grass Fed Galloway Beef as a healthy and sustainable alternative to more conventional production. They run a cow-calf to finish operation with mixed grass pasture/hay as the only feed source.

Holsinger Homeplace Farms energizes with diversity and minimizes soil disturbance through practicing rotational grazing. They use silvopastures, where commercial timber and livestock are grown and managed in the same area.
