

Buzz on the Range ProjectOverview and Grazing Plan for Producer Partners

Objectives:

- Seed 4 species of pollinator-promoting native rangeland grasses to promote pollinator health and presence in the rangeland.
- Increase biodiversity, soil infiltration, and soil microbiology with multispecies forage and targeted grazing.

Timeframe: 2022 growing season, 2023 growing season, 2024 growing season

Measurements:

Bee Assessments	 2 days, set 24 hour bee traps near test pasture, collect samples and inventory species, full report delivered to producer 2022 (2 producers), 2023 (3 producers) – pollinator baselines 2024 – pollinator final surveys
Rangeland Health Assessments	 Ecological Outcome Verification (EOV) short term monitoring assessments each year Grass species inventory on a transect each year Soil sampling and testing first year

Protocol:

- Feed seed to cows in loose mineral at ratio of 6 cups to 5 gallons of mineral
- Graze the cows in a small controlled paddock from starting 24 hours after the feed to 60 hours after feed (1 day after to 2-3 days after)
 - WAFTL will provide electric wire setup for 1-2 acre paddock for this if needed.

- Graze paddock as needed rest of year, but bonus points if you let rest till next year.
