Suggested Fees

Farmers' time is valuable; plan to pay them for their services. NCR-SARE recognizes that farmers and ranchers are skilled workers who should be paid \$25 per hour or more for their labor in grant projects. Payment should also reflect preparation time, expertise, and effort required; thus, if funding allows, it might be appropriate to offer \$200-400 for a short speaking workshop engagement, and \$400-800 for hosting or leading a full-day event.

If the event requires travel, make sure you can cover mileage, hotel stays, and food costs. For large expenses such as a flight or hotel stay, offer to cover costs directly rather than requiring the farmer to pay out of pocket and get reimbursed.

Wendy Johnson - Jóia Food and Fiber Farm Northeast Iowa

Wendy Johnson runs Jóia Food & Fiber Farm, a 130-acre diversified perennial farm that she converted from corn and soybeans to organic row crop to eventually organic perennial crops and forages for grazing. She and her family have also added agroforestry practices such as a riparian buffer, enhanced windbreaks, silvopasture and a micro-orchard. They raise cattle, sheep, pigs, and poultry; make flour out of perennial grain; and sell flour, meats, eggs and wool products direct to consumer, which gives them more control over what they grow and what they receive for their products. Wendy says, "As a farmer, that is true freedom to farm."

Wendy also manages her family farm, which is a conventional corn/soybean farm. She has implemented cover crops, no-till corn, and small grains in a crop rotation, 60" row corn with cover crops, and is starting to add some livestock, all on a much larger scale of 1,000 acres.

Wendy says: "There is still a lot of work to be done, but it is interesting to share the differences in what I have observed over the last 8 or so years as it relates to government policy and protections and climate change (or changing climate, depending on my audience). And as I think about the future of agriculture and lack of farmers being able to access land, I am working toward a more collective and equitable future of agriculture that I like to share with others to help start them thinking about land tenure and conservation."

Mark Peterson - Bent Gate Farms Southwest Iowa

Mark and wife Melanie farm 500 acres in southwest Iowa that ranges from flat to D-slope, and from mid-40's to almost 90 Corn Suitability Rating. They grow corn, soybeans, wheat, oats, and rye, and a rotation of single- and multi-species cover crops, all using no-till practices, and incorporating cover crop grazing with the neighbor's cattle. These soil health practices have led to noticeable increases in organic matter, water holding capacity, and even corn yields. Mark is a past board president of Practical Farmers of Iowa (PFI).
