
PARTNERS FOR CONSERVATION PROGRAM:

This project allowed students to learn about planting techniques and get their hands dirty!





POLLINATOR HABITAT FIELD DAY

On Friday June 16th, the Kendall and Grundy County SWCDs partnered with Pheasants Forever, NRCS, and Pollinator Partnership to put on a Pollinator Habitat Field Day. Participants learned about the benefits of pollinator habitat, assistance programs available to landowners, and got the chance to visit two local pollinator habitat sites. We had great discussion and even had a few plant experts in the group who shared their knowledge on the native species we observed! USED OIL DRIVE HELD

The Kendall County Soil & Water Conservation District hosted their annual Used Oil Drive on Saturday, June 17th

We had much success with those who volunteered their time to go into classrooms and share the wonderful ag in the classroom presentations this past school year! We reached over 7,000 students with 4 unique presentations on pumpkins, soil, erosion, and beef. This year, the Kendall County Ag in the Classroom program will have the trained volunteer presenters deliver classroom lessons on apples, soybeans, water, and pollinators.

This Fall, students will experiment with apples and make soy plastic. All programs are free of cost and make excellent curricular tie-ins. 16th Natural Resources Tour 2023



Thank you to these organizations for supporting the Ag in the Classroom program: Kendall County Board, Kendall County Farm Bureau Foundation, Kendall County Young Leaders, and Kendall County Beef Producers. In May, about 415, 4th grade students from Emily G. Johns and 5th grade students from Yorkville Intermediate School attended the 16th annual Kendall County Natural Resource Tour. While at this tour, students learned about soil, trees, river ecology, watersheds, wild life conservation, recycling, mosquitos, ticks, bird migration, and more. Students had fun outdoors, got their hands dirty, and learned a lot during this interactive tour.

This year's tour was hosted at Silver Springs State Park around Loon Lake and organized by the Kendall County Agriculture in the Classroom program, which is housed by the Kendall County Soil and Water Conservation District. Many different local organizations and agencies made this event possible through their participation. These organizations included the Kendall County Soil and Water Conservation District, Kendall County Forest Preserve District, Kendall County Outdoor Education Center, Kendall County Environmental Health Department, and University of Illinois Extension. Additional presenters included Illinois Conservation Police, Friends of the Fox River, and Grundy County Soil & Water Conservation District. Funding for the tour is made available through the Kendall County Soil and Water Conservation District. This tour is free for Kendall County schools to attend. page 4

Summer Ag Institute 2023





Teachers from Will, La Salle, Grundy, and Kendall Counties attended this 4-day event. They learned about ways to connect agriculture in their classrooms and about many resources that are available to them where they can integrate them into their regular lessons. On the first day, teachers toured the Starved Rock Lock & Dam, an apple farm, bee farm, and alpaca farm. On the second day, they toured Union Pacific Intermodal, Abraham Lincoln National Cemetery, Midewin National Tallgrass Prairie, and a dairy farm. On the third day, they toured Heap's Pumpkin Farm, Red Bud Creek Farm, Homegrown Meat Company, and Stewarts Farm. On the fourth day, teachers toured the biodiesel plant Renewable Energy Group and FS Grain Elevator and ended with hearing from agriculture groups and Illinois Ag in the Classroom providing many resources and lessons for teachers to add to their classrooms. Teachers left excited to integrate these hands-on learning activities in their classrooms.

Agriculture Career Field Trip Series

Over 6 days, high school students from various Kendall County schools, most without agriculture education in their schools, were invited to participate in a summer experiential learning experience in which they were able to travel to various businesses and

organizations to learn about different careers related to agriculture, food, and natural resources. This field trip series was a SARE grant funded opportunity and coordinated by the Kendall County Soil & Water Conservation District.

Students learned about more than 18 different careers. Some careers students were able to learn about from experts include: Soil Conservationist, Conservationist Police Officer, Fisheries Biologist, Grain Farmer, Plant Manager, Sanitarian, Dietitian, Agriculture Teacher, Beef Feeder, Butcher, Lab Technician, Director of Waste Management, Farm Mechanic, Chef, and many more.



Businesses and organizations that the students were able to experience included: Newark High School FFA, CHS, Seattle Sutton, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Yorkville-Bristol Sanitary District, Kendall County Environmental Health Department, Redbud Creek Farm, Clearview Pork Farm, Natural Resources Conservation Service, Kendall County Soil and Water Conservation District, Stewart Farms, S& H Seeds, and Homegrown Meats.

In a post survey of the experience, all students marked that they would consider a career in agriculture and loved all the exposure these careers had in being outside. Many students mentioned they would love to do this again next year and recommend it to others.



Financial Incentives & Technical Assistance Available

New funding supports increased access to financial incentives through NRCS programs. Whether you are a grain producer, livestock producer, specialty crop producer, a forest landowner, or a suburban resident there are opportunities available for you and your operation.

Have you considered cover crops, reduced-till, strip-till, no-till or nutrient management? Interested in building soil health, creating wildlife habitat or tree/shrub plantings? Need to address erosion concerns with the recent weather events? Now is time to take advantage of newly available funding.

Contact NRCS, at your local field office, in Kendall County, to learn about new opportunities for conservation on your farm, information on available programs, conservation practices eligible for financial incentives and the program application process. Even if you are not currently ready to implement any new conservation practices, now is a great time to learn about the expanded financial opportunities that are now available.

Below is a snapshot of available programs, through NRCS:

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)

EQIP addresses resource concerns through conservation practices; payment is provided based on each practice.

Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)

CSP helps producers take conservation activities on the farm to the next level. CSP is for cropland and pastureland; the program supports producers to build on existing conservation efforts while strengthening the entire operation. Payment is provided for current conservation stewardship and additional practice or enhancement activities. Program applications are accepted on an ongoing basis and cutoffs are provided during the fiscal year where applications received by that date are considered for available funding. 
