- Very dependent on the state: cottage food laws
- "I'm normally the person someone calls because they are having issues"
 - Zoning and Land Bank
- Issues:
 - Licensing....education about why food safety is needed and what needs to be done
 - overwhelming requirements for commercial kitchens
 - o real estate vs. farming
 - organic certification
- Strengths::
 - adjusting requirements for small producers/vendors

Do you think local or state policies/regulations and programs in your state are adequate in supporting local food and sustainable farmers - Why or why not?

- General sense that policies/regulations/programs are adequate
 - accessibility, awareness
- Programs and policies to benefit consumers: SNAP, WIC, Senior FM Nutrition
 Program
- Issues: rural vs. urban, state promotion campaign vs. neighbors, organic certification
- Strengths:
 - 'there are federal government programs that give us benefits when we need help'
 - societal shift
 - ommunity work to ease process for FM and smaller growers

From your perspective, what type of agenda priorities need to be in a state food plan to benefit you and other local food farmers in your state?

- Direct connections between growers and point of sale
 - Double Up/WIC/voucher programs: learning curve, processing equipment, sites to accept
- Requiring locally-produced: points of sale, larger distributors, schools, institutions
- Consider urban (eg. zoning) vs. rural needs (eg. land protection)
- Land access, development pressure
- Meat processors
- Network development
- "Often when you say 'on the east coast, they do this' it doesn't work
