

CDFW Interim Grant Program Application Process: Livestock Loss & Deterrence Methods Compensation

Goal: To simplify the application process for ranchers seeking compensation from CDFW’s Interim Wolf Livestock Compensation Grants Program. CDFW currently has two grants available for ranchers managing wolf-livestock conflict: Livestock Loss Compensation and Deterrence Method(s) Compensation. Note: A confirmed, or probable depredation event alone **does not** trigger the issuance of compensation. It is the applicant’s responsibility to submit all required paperwork for reimbursement. Several resources exist to assist you with the paperwork, including Patrick Griffin, Siskiyou County Wolf Liaison (call or text Patrick at 530-598-6950).

Follow these steps to apply for one of CDFW’s wolf grants:

1. Navigate to site (search “wolf livestock compensation grants”, click first link) and select grant type.
2. Download the PDF application or print a copy (visit the UCCE Siskiyou office for a printed copy).
3. Fill out required information - see examples below.
4. Email draft application form to Victoria (Vicky) Monroe, CDFW Conflict Programs Coordinator, at victoria.monroe@wildlife.ca.gov (Vicky’s phone number: 916-856-8335).
 - *Vicky translates your application form into an application package and invoice for final processing and payment by the State Controller’s Office.*
5. CDFW will submit invoice for final processing and payment by the State Controller’s Office (treasurer).

Open the camera on your smartphone and hover it over the QR code (right) to be linked directly to the form.

Page 1 (not included) requires owner and contact information. Page 2 requires livestock loss information and total compensation request. See below:

If your Determination Form has not been posted online, instead provide the date you reported the depredation event and date of investigation (to expedite application submission).

Example: Allowable costs that may be submitted due to injuries. Reimbursement cannot exceed fair market value of injured animal.

LIVESTOCK LOSS COMPENSATION
Grant funding is now available to compensate producers for actual loss of animals (death, injury) due to confirmed or probable wolf depredation occurring on or after September 23, 2021. Cause of death will be determined during a depredation investigation and documented in a CDFW Livestock Loss Determination Form. Provide all required information below.

FAIR MARKET VALUE
Provide estimated fair market value for livestock to be considered for compensation. Attach documentation such as USDA value determinations, executed sale contract, or executed sale contract for like animals. Compensation for livestock loss applications will be based on fair market value (FMV) at the time of sale, if loss had not occurred, as determined by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) unless a valid sale contract or other valuation method sets a different value.

Grant funding is now available to compensate livestock producers for the use of non-lethal deterrent tools to deter wolf presence near livestock. The CDFW supports the use of various non-lethal techniques to deter wolf presence near livestock. Provide all required information below.
